Background

For a summary of Lorraine's life and activism a good introduction is her obituary in The Guardian here. A longer account as a book is underway.

Lorraine's campaign t-shirts are safely held within the Archives+ service based in Manchester's Central Library. This is the same location as the wider Disabled People's Archive.

These t-shirts are part of her wider collection, mostly papers, and benefit from the skills and knowledge of the council's staff in the Costume Museum too.

These t-shirts can be loaned to exhibitions that follow The National Archives standards for safe inter-organisational loans from public archives.

This booklet is essentially a visual and textual catalogue of this part of her wider collection within the archive.

Hopefully the captions for each image of these t-shirts each have sufficient detail for visually impaired readers, and feedback is welcomed.

Introduction

In some ways the disabled people's movement has come a long way during Lorraine's lifetime of campaigning. As three examples:

Disabled people's rights are studied in schools, including the recent textbook by the Oxford University Press for GCSE History students at Key Stage 3 which explains the social model, independent living, self-organised groups and civil rights to 11-14 year olds. The introductory timeline includes the Independent Living Fund.

The 11-month exhibition in 2022 / 23 in the centre of Manchester at the People's History Museum – Nothing About Us Without Us – which employed disabled people as curators and consulted widely on its contents and messages.

The broadcasting on mainstream television by the BBC of a dramatised history of disabled people campaigning to Block Telethon – Then Barbara Met Alan, portrayed by disabled actors.

However, the lived experiences of many disabled people in the UK at the time of writing are ones of increasing

- poverty repeated benefit cuts from 2010 onwards,
- neglect the ending of cost-of-living heating payments for Personal Independent Payment (PIP) recipients,
- isolation the crisis in UK social care with fewer and lower direct payments for personal assistants (PAs).

Despite many substantial social and cultural advances there is still a need for these t-shirts and the campaigning which they vividly document.

So, I'd suggest today's t-shirt collections will include the likes of Disabled People Against Cuts – DPAC.








